## The Consumption of Culture, 1600-1800

Originally published between 1838-1847 "A Harlot High and Low" continues the story of Lucien de Rubempre from Honore de Balzac's preceding novel "Lost Illusions." Central to the tale is the pact made between Lucien and Vautrin in which Lucien will arrive at success in Paris if he agrees to follow Vautrin's

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instructions on how to do so. A love affair between the beautiful Esther van Gobseck and Lucien creates a conflict for their plans of bringing Lucien to his desired exaltation though. When Vautrin realizes that wealthy Baron de Nucingen has fallen in love with Esther he conspires to use the Baron's affection with Esther to help advance Lucien. What follows is a series of tragic consequences. Another chapter in Balzac's magnum opus, "The Human Comedy," "A Harlot High and Low" is at once a biting commentary of French aristocratic society and examination of the criminal underworld in which Vautrin is so very well at home.

Eugenia Grandet ( Eugenie Grandet ) is a novel by Honore de Balzac first published in the weekly L' Europe littéraire ( literary Europe) in September 1833 , the first year of the magazine. The title of this first edition was Eugénie Grandet , histoire de province . It was already published in book form in 1834 , at the publishing house of Madame Charles- Béchet ; Later , in 1839 , at the publishing of Gervais Charpentier, with a dedication to that Balzac he had been lover : Maria du Fresnay . In the Furne edition, 1843 , the novel was part of the series The Human Comedy , in the first volume of Scènes de la vie de province ; and , within it, it was between novels and Pierrette Ursule Mirouët .

### **Redeeming Love**

Honoré de Balzac's Treatise on Modern Stimulants is a meditation on five stimulants--tea, sugar, coffee, alcohol and tobacco--by an author very conscious of the fact that his gargantuan output of work was

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driven by an excessive intake (his bouts of writing typically required 10 to 15 cups of coffee a day) that would ultimately shorten his life. First published in French in 1839 as an appendix to Jean Anthelme Brillat-Savarin's *Physiology of Taste*, this *Treatise* was at once Balzac's effort at addressing what he perceived to be an oversight in that cornerstone of gastronomic literature; a chapter toward his never-completed body of analytic studies (alongside such essays as *Treatise on Elegant Living*) that were to form an overarching "pathology of social life"; and a meditation on the impact of pleasure and excess on the body and the role they play in shaping society. Balzac here describes his "terrible and cruel method" for brewing a coffee that can help the artist and author find inspiration; explains why tobacco can be credited with having brought peace to Germany; and describes his first experience of alcoholic intoxication (which required seventeen bottles of wine and two cigars). Beyond its braggadocio and whimsy, though, this treatise ultimately speaks to Balzac's obsession with death and decline, and attempts to confront in capsule form the broader implications of dissipating one's vital forces. This edition includes illustrations to an earlier French edition by Pierre Alechinsky.

The mapping of the consumption of culture reveals a complex cultural organization of economic transactions, social institutions and ideological apparatuses that continually redrew the boundaries between social classes, between public and private life, between high art and low, and between men and women. As an inquiry into the consumption rather

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than the production of culture, the present volume looks upon the history of aesthetic artifacts as a history of their diverse receptions. 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Christmas Pudding and Pigeon Pie are two sparkling comedies from early in the career of Nancy Mitford, beloved author of *The Pursuit of Love* and *Love in a Cold Climate*, here published in one volume with a new introduction by Jane Smiley.
